Prayer of Jabez and our 60 Day Prayer Challenge

Diane Sawyer, former co-anchor for, "Good Morning America" talked in Guidepost magazine about meeting Catherine Marshall, the famous author. Expecting a typical pep talk, Diane was not prepared for what Catherine had to say: "You have set goals, but I don't think you set them high enough. I think you should take those goals and expand them. Think of the most you could do with your life. Make what you do matter. Above all, dream big."

Diane took her message to heart and has learned to dream big but what about the rest of us? Will God help us set higher goals and learn to dream big? Has your church learned to dream big?

"Larry, I have a stressful schedule and work too hard already? What more can God expect?"

Dreaming big has nothing to do with stress or work habits. Here is the question: "Do you believe God can do big things through you and your church? Are you seeking to fulfill God's purpose?"

Years ago, churches studied "Prayer of Jabez" a book by Bruce Wilkinson about a virtually unknown Bible character named Jabez. Bruce found this prayer in 1 Chronicles of the Bible:

"Oh, that You would bless me indeed and enlarge my territory that Your hand would be with me and that You would keep me from evil, that I may not cause pain!"

Many lives were changed as our church took the "Prayer of Jabez" challenge asking God to "enlarge our territory." One answer came within months when we found ourselves sharing facilities with a church destroyed by a tornado. The unique relationship forged between our two congregations, white, black, Baptist and Methodist created many unique ministry experiences and resulted in our community rebuilding their church.

Catherine Marshall said: "Think of the most you could do with your lives. Make what you do matter. Above all, dream big." God can do big things through you and your church.

For sixty days, I challenge you to join me in dreaming big and ask God to enlarge your territory: "Oh, that You would bless me indeed and enlarge my territory that Your hand would be with me and that You would keep me from evil, that I may not cause pain!" Here is what I predict:

You will have your life and purpose stretched far beyond what you ever imagined. Some of you will make radical life changing decisions over the next few months. Most of you will see a clear example of God working within your life. Our church will become more of a leader and example within our community. Our church will take on at least one new special project through God's leading. Our church will also begin to grow as you continue to make a difference for God.

Will you join me in "dreaming big" and take the "Prayer of Jabez" sixty-day challenge?

SCHOOL DRESSING DAYS - 2018



For the past 40 plus years, events now known as School Dressing Days, have been held in Fredericksburg for the benefit of children who need a little help getting ready for the start of school. This year the event will be held on Friday, August 10 and Saturday, August 11 at the Church of

Jesus Christ of Latter Day Saints on Bragg Road in Fredericksburg.

Children from Kindergarten through 12th grade are eligible to attend as well as Head Start children with an acceptance letter. The event serves children from Fredericksburg, Stafford, Spotsylvania, Caroline and King George counties. Children receive backpacks, basic school supplies based on grade, toiletries, new jeans and shirts, new underwear and socks (now including undershirts for boys and bras for girls), new or gently used outerwear (jackets, coats, or hoodies) and shoes. When a nurse is available, the TDAP inoculation is also

available for rising 6th graders.

Pre-registration is required and there are at least 6 pre-registration dates scheduled, including three at FUMC. Over 1400 children have been helped each of the past two years. Volunteers are needed to help at



the event in August. Some take the families through the well-organized areas of the church and help them select the items of their choice. Other volunteers work at the various stations keeping things orderly and offering additional assistance. Spanish-speaking individuals are always needed. Help is also needed during the Wednesday and Thursday set-up times and early Monday morning to get materials back to the storage area. Signing up to volunteer is done through SignUpGenius; when the link is available, it will be disseminated in an upcoming newsletter.

SDD Fundraiser: <u>Monday, May 7 all day at Harry's Ale</u> <u>House in the Harrison Crossing Shopping Center</u>; get the Charity Steak Dinner for \$7.95 and SDD gets \$2.00. \$400 was raised last year from this event. Thanks to Harry's Ale House.

CANDLEBURNING OFFERING

Backpacks for the Fredericksburg City Schools

UMM sponsored the first packing event for the Backpacks for Fredericksburg City Schools. This is a pro-

gram started through the Stafford Food Security program run by Tim White. He can provide a back pack with a dinner for 4 people at a cost of around \$8. These are provided to schools to distribute as they find a need. The Men's group agreed to sponsor this program by sponsoring a packing event and helping to pay for the food used in the packing event.

The first packing event occurred after the 9:30 service and we put together 100 backpacks. The men's group would like to arrange for a donation of \$800 to Stafford Food Security. We would like to request donations from the congregation with the men's group making up the difference. Donations can be made directly to the Men's group or to the church with marking the donation for the Backpacks for Schools program.

MISSION CHURCH

Conference Flood Buckets - Every year the Virginia Conference requests relief kits put together and taken to Annual Conference so that they can be presented to UMCOR for use in aiding in Emergency Situations around the world. The Methodist Men have taken a lead in providing Flood Buckets (otherwise known as Cleaning buckets). Last year FUMC sent 12 buckets to conference that were each created by an individual or family. The cost of each was around \$55.

This year the Men's group would like to purchase all the supplies centrally and use the June 9 Meeting of the Men's group as a packing event. We think that we can do this for around \$37 a bucket if we do 40 buckets with an additional donation for shipping. By purchasing the supplies through the Men's group, we would be able to reduce the cost.

The Men's group will have a bucket available in the gathering space between services for making donations to help support this effort. In addition, we would like to invite all men to our June Breakfast meeting **on June 9th** at 8 A.M. to assist in the packing event.



Our FUMC United Methodist Women have initiated a campaign to enable our church to deliver UMCOR kits, as well as monetary contributions, to the VA Annual Conference in June. We need the willing support and prayerful cooperation of all our members to accomplish this task. Recent disasters, such as tornados and flooding in our own state of Virginia, have shown just how important these kits are in times of crisis.

Foundation News

The Board of the Fredericksburg United Methodist Foundation has made \$46,911 in annual disbursements for 2018 to assist in the missions of FUMC. Appropriations were made from the following funds:

Hargan Music--\$2,266.

Grace M. Biscoe--\$6,335 for general support. Mission--\$1,667.

Open Capital--\$26,950 for maintenance.

Scholarship--\$2,000 for two \$1,000 scholarships to FUMC members graduating from high school this spring.

Elnora O. Johnson--\$7,693 used for community dinners.

The Foundation has received a \$10,000 gift to be added to the Larry and Amy Lenow Fund, the proceeds of which are used to support seminary students.

The Foundation was established by FUMC to provide an entity for the investment of funds donated to the Church. Investments are made through the services of the Virginia United Methodist Foundation.

The Foundation provides the opportunity for members to establish their FUMC legacy by donating a minimum of \$20,000 for a new named fund, donating to an existing fund, or purchasing a gift annuity.

Gift annuities provide an income for the life of the donor, the amount depending of the age of the donor at the time of purchase. Tips from our Fredericksburg Tree Steward (Libby Wasem):

- Never bury the root flare, the part above the roots that joins the trunk. The tree needs the flare to take in oxygen and nutrients.
- Never place mulch up against the tree. Keep mulch three inches away from the trunk.
- Mulch under the tree about three feet out and no more than 2 inches deep.
- Suggestions for type of mulch? Mini-pine nuggets or Virginia fine mulch because they hold the water in, but allow rain to penetrate the soil.
- It is better not to plant grass or plants beneath the tree. They compete for oxygen and nutrients your tree roots need to be healthy.
- Water and enjoy your tree.
